Health Enhancement Research Organization and Care Continuum Alliance announce public comment period for recommended core metrics for employee health management programs

EDINA, Minn. (Dec. 10, 2013)—Improving employee health and creating healthy workplaces is becoming a focus for a growing number of employers. In fact, a recent survey from *Employee Benefits News* indicates that 85 percent of large companies and 81 percent of small companies have an employee health management, or wellness program in place. But how to measure the effectiveness of wellness programs has, until now, been a point of often-heated debate.

To make the process of measuring workplace health management programs more consistent and relevant to business leaders, the <u>Health Enhancement Research Organization (HERO)</u> and the <u>Care Continuum Alliance (CCA)</u> have developed a proposed set of core metrics for employee health management programs. The metrics, which are detailed in a paper titled, <u>"Program Measurement and Evaluation Guide: Core Metrics for Employee Health</u> <u>Management,"</u> are intended to serve as a guide to help employers, benefits professionals and wellness program providers measure their employee health management programs. HERO and CCA are currently seeking public commentary on the paper, which will be submitted for peer review in early 2014.
